


Creating Functional Spaces


After being in lockdown for several months, many families have started to reassess their living space. They're having more sit-down family dinners, and now, their kitchen doesn't give them the movement or storage they need. Or they're working from home and need to add more space to provide a level of privacy.

Whether it's from additions to create multi-functional spaces to kitchen renovations with an office, Pioneer Craftsmen has been receiving inquiries and we thought we'd share these trends with you:

- Maximize your space. Add floor to ceiling storage to make use of any additional space in your home. For this kitchen, we added additional cabinets and a countertop to break up the cabinets and make the space more versatile. If you're a coffee lover, you could use this as your coffee bar. If you're running out of counter space on your island, this provides another place for you to use to store, display, cook the possibilities are endless!
- Hidden hardware and storage. Keep the chaos out of your kitchen by incorporating clean lines. Minimalist details like removing hardware and hiding storage in unlikely places are increasingly popular in the kitchen. When it comes to kitchen cabinets, less is more with invisible push-style latches or integrated handles for your cabinets and pairs perfectly with your hidden storage.
- A clean workspace. A designated work area is a must when you're working from home or your child needs a space to do homework. Setting up the space isn't always easy since you may not have room for it. This family opted for making an uncluttered, minimalist setup off their kitchen. This integrates well with their space by tucking the desk into an alcove area and creating a built-in desk and storage that's clean-lined.









- Multi-functional space. This year has made many of us rethink how we use our rooms. When spending more time at home, it makes less sense to dedicate whole rooms to just one purpose especially in smaller spaces. With this in mind, creative storage and design solutions are becoming increasingly popular to help homes utilize their space better to fit their family's needs. This home converted their underutilized attic into a multi-functioning space - a lounge area for the whole family and a playroom for the kids. Bonus - we were able to add built-in shelves that made use of the space behind the walls due to the slanted ceiling.
- Keep it natural. A great way to incorporate a calming atmosphere to your home is to bring the outside in natural textures and greenery. By mixing natural textures like a wooden barn door and nude tones in your decor, you create a perfect and relaxing retreat especially in the bedroom. If you add in houseplants into your decor, it can help refresh your air and brighten your mood.
- 6 Lighten it up. With so many of our lives on-the-go, we're always looking to calm and center our living space so we have a place to retreat and relax. One of the easiest ways to incorporate a peaceful atmosphere in your living space is to maximize the natural light. Opt for more minimalist window treatments to let as much light in as possible.

Air Fryer Garlic Herb Turkey Breast

YIELDS: 6 SERVINGS PREP TIME: 10 MIN. TOTAL TIME 1 HR.

INGREDIENTS

2 lb. turkey breast, skin on Kosher salt Freshly ground black pepper 4 tbsp. butter, melted

3 cloves garlic, minced

1 tsp. freshly chopped thyme 1 tsp. freshly chopped rosemary

INSTRUCTIONS

Pat turkey breast dry and season on both sides with salt and pepper.

2. In a small bowl, combine melted butter, garlic, thyme, and rosemary. Brush butter all over turkey breast.

3. Place in basket of air fryer, skin side up and cook at 375° for 40 minutes or until internal temperature reaches 160°, flipping halfway through.

4 Let rest for 5 minutes before slicing

Get Your Home Winter Ready



- Clean your eavestroughs and downspouts to help stop water from finding a way inside and preventing critters from nesting.
- Caulk around windows, doors and other openings to ensure you have a good seal to help you waste less energy and save you money.
- Do a visual check of the weather stripping around exterior doors and windows (including your garage door) and replace it if it appears worn or cracked.
- Inspect your roof and chimney to be aware of any problems with your roof before starts seeping in after a bad storm.
- Shut-off and drain outside faucets to prevent pipes and faucets from bursting or cracking during the freezing cold months
- Clean and inspect your furnace since you're about to turn the heat back on and spend most of your time breathing the air it distributes.
